A Blessing

They had traveled all night to come to this corner. Arriving just before dawn, they had staked out their territory with smoking incense and burning pots. Just three years old, he could remember last year when the crackers had gone off too close to his face and the smoking paper had left a trail of black across his nose.

Grandma had come from her distant village and Uncles and Aunts were gathering. He quietly watched each face, looking for a happy person to be close to. This was a very solemn occasion and smiles were few. In fact good humor had fled the street again. Trying hard to stay out of their way, Ming joined with his cousin. They found some entertainment in a local kitten and were just about to make it their own when the shop door sprung open and the little cat raced for safety from this mob of strangers forming on her doorstep. Like them, she was very intimidated by the sights and sounds of the early morning. The usually docile village was being turned into a grotto of worship for the idol.

Ming watched as his father climbed the electric pole. An older cousin took a large roll of fireworks from its box and began to feed it to the man on the pole. With the help of other older boys they tossed the roll to each other until the overhead wire was wrapped in 4-inch explosives that would detonate just as the idol passed beneath them.

“Why?” He wondered. “did someone who was supposed to bring you peace need such noise to be holy?”

His thoughts were interrupted by a sweeping arm that carried him aloft. His favorite Aunt had arrived. With the usual face kisses and nose rubs she conveyed her love for him.

Ming liked her. She was usually happy and always had something special for him. Having no children of her own, she had prostrated herself in the street for the idol to pass over her in the hopes that she would have a baby. Last year she held him in her hands there in the street hoping the idol would see him and give a boy of her own. It had been frightening laying there in the middle of the street with all the fireworks and the sounds of the mob as the idol passed over them, but his aunt had assured him that it would be alright and that the idol would be influenced by his devotion.

Ming really didn't know anything about the idol or if he had any devotion, but for Auntie he would lie down in the street any time.

SEAPC Cambodia

While Grace and Boeurn have been traveling to all of the orphanages in March, much of the email communication that I have received from Cambodia has been about the Cambodia Christian School Network (CCSN). Some emails have been photos of the two school buildings under construction in Banteay Meanchey and Kampong Thom (look on our website to see them). Some have been requests for funds to be wired, and some have discussed the science curriculum being written or the national science center that the Cambodian government has requested SEAPC to develop. Each email clearly shows what Jesus is doing in Cambodia.

I recently received two emails which contained biography files on each of our teachers at Rongko. Why did these emails strike me? I was looking at brief descriptions of 60 lives that are affecting thousands of others. I learned a lot about them. Of these teachers, 37 are men and 23 are women, ranging in age from 21 to 59. Some are single while others are married with anywhere from zero to six children. Some have been teachers since 1981, while others just

started to teach this year. Some speak only Khmer, while others know four languages. Some have only known the Cambodia that exists after the Khmer Rouge while others saw the Cambodia that existed previously and suffered through that horrific time.

I am sure that some of these teachers were skeptical of SEAPC-Cambodia when they first started with us. They may have only comprehended the requirements – strict attendance rules, frequent trainings and weekly bible class (definitely strange to those

who were Buddhist), but decided to give it a try. What they found was Jesus and the joy and wisdom that He brings. Now, they are sharing what they learned with the next generation. Lift them up in prayer regularly because each day, they impact around 2,000 children – Cambodia’s future.

The Lord is giving us a great harvest in these two nations. He is touching so many hearts to be able to believe and the numbers are ever increasing. Taiwan now claims 4 percent Christian and numbers from Laos are very difficult to get, but the churches are steadily growing. In the next five years in Tibet we will pray with 9,000 families to receive the Lord while their children are cured from Congenital Heart Disease. This is a great harvest and we will need Disciples to gather it in. Please pray daily for workers.

Prayer Testimony

The news came out in dribbles. First, a word from Dr. Keller that there had been a change in administration at the Lhasa hospital. Then, a CNN report of riots in the Lhasa streets.

Because of her excellent work in establishing the new facility, and because of her international connections, Dr. Wang has been promoted from the Directorship of the hospital to become the Secretary for Health and Human Services for the Tibet Autonomous Region of Tibet. In this position she will direct our ongoing project to establish a comprehensive health care system for the inhabitants of the region. Thus we will have the access we need to find the 9,000 children with Congenital Heart Disorder and to bring the good news of Jesus to all.

We are very thankful to the Lord for His answer to nine years of daily prayer that a worker, who has heard and received the Word, would have an open door to proclaim His love through healing. Born and raised in Tibet of Chinese parents, she is fluent in Tibetan dialects and feels that she is Tibetan. She has declined many positions in other parts of China, choosing rather to suffer the hardships of life in Tibet with a dream of bringing health care to the entire region.

The CNN news was that the Chinese government has squashed an uprising of Buddhist monks at two key monasteries. Matthew reports that just a few days before this happened we had a prayer team from Taiwan interceding in those monasteries asking the Lord to break the spiritual power these places hold over the people.

Last fall another child died because her parents refused treatment on a word from one of these monks. The parents were told their child died because the spirit of death had entered the family when someone ate fish from a river where dead bodies had been fed to the spirit in the fish. The child had heart disease that could have been treated at no cost to the family, but they declined. That, my friend, is bondage. That is why we ask you to pray with us.

We have seen the power of prayer manifest in these two events. Please continue to pray for this little mountaintop. The people are poor, they are oppressed and they need Jesus.

Dr. Lawrence Ng wrote these words in early March. Please see the amazing events to follow in “Prayer Testimony” on page three.

With a 5-year contract that commits SEAPC to \$15 million as well as the multitude of expertise required for such an undertaking, February saw the coming together of partners past, present and future, in the city of Hong Kong. Here, seven years ago, the Lord used a dear sister, Agatha Chan, mightily to garner support for Touching Hearts. This recent meeting took place in a time when Hong Kong was receiving worldwide attention for the exposed sexual immorality of its celebrities, in a time of remembrance of Agatha Chan, whose legacy and impact on Hong Kong further accentuates her earthly absence, emphasizing the reality that this is not a project fulfilled by money and technical expertise, not a war fought by chariots and horses.

It is now March, I confess to you all that I do not know what has truly transpired and what

will transpire in the days to come. But I am comforted that we do not have to lean on our understanding. We know that we are not just a Christian Medical Mission program in Tibet. Programs usually start big, and as their novelty wanes, they fizzle and become small. Movements on the other hand, generally start very small and become huge. We know that we are all called to be part of a movement, a movement that started over 2,000 years ago with the Son of God. He spent much time relating with generally just 12 disciples, and some would say he was closest to just 4.

The Lord has opened this door for us in a land which has seen missionary efforts dating over 1,000 years back. It began with Nestorian Christians, to a time now where we can have a presence and serve a distinct basic need – not just to realize a medical program to glorify His name, but to continue His movement. He desires to reach the unreached. Pray for us all, that we take His example by heart. Pray that as workers joined in the fray to take the lead in their various roles;

they would lead by His example, which is to serve and pour Himself into others around him. Let the faithful be guided by the following verse: 2 Tim. 2:2 – “And the things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses entrust to reliable men who will also be qualified to teach others.”

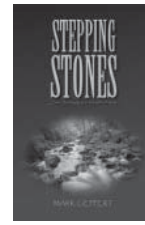

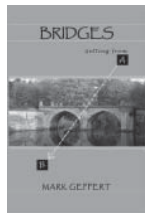
Ken Martin is an Attack Lamb in action. We are deeply grateful for who he is and all that he does. It is an honor to know him.

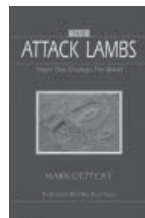

Across from me was a man who had given ten years to this work, to his right was his first disciple. His first disciple had just finished training the young man to my left in two years of Bible, Micro-economics, Church Planting, Leadership and English. We were discussing the tremendous outpouring of the Holy Spirit and church growth in this particular region with those who had come to know Christ and received training through this ministry over the years. There were six churches present, and every one of them had faced persecution. Those of us at the table who could relate did so and a connection too powerful for words filled the room. A tremendous spread was laid out and we all began to fellowship and eat.

Now, I've had green soup before and I have eaten a lot of tripe and animal stomach in my travels so, I wasn't too concerned with

what was in front of me. My neighbor grabbed a spoon and took a big sip, “Wow, that is bitter.” Curiosity took over and my spoon jumped right in, “Man, that's ridiculously bitter. What is that?” I felt my hand go over my mouth, frantically trying to grab the words out of the air. I didn't just ask what was in the green soup did I?

Too late, the words hit the ears of our gracious host. Something quickly came back in the local language. Please remember, the young guy to my left is fresh out of classes and eager to practice what he's learned. Oh no, he's gonna translate. “You see brother Matt,” he said, “We cut the stomach and pour what is inside it into that bowl, then we cook the stomach and put it too into the bowl.”

This work, the time spent and sacrifice made to sustain it, the directors, and the young disciple sitting to my left truly stand as an example and an answer to many questions I have had about SEAPC in the past year. Last year we were asked by our board to develop succession planning within the ministry. This

question birthed ten months of research, discussion and debate. In November we came to the realization that we are all parts growing and functioning at different levels.

SEAPC is many different things to many different people. To these people, SEAPC is a group of thousands around the world who are daily praying for them as they face real persecutions. They are finding strength and comfort in those prayers. As I saw this network literally growing in front of me over some nasty green soup, I felt a real appreciation for all of the leaders, board members, administrators in SEAPC and the community that we have become. I thank God for this team and I am thrilled to work with the disciples who are becoming leaders for the next generation around the globe. Thank you for giving, praying, and going.

A big vision is needed before smaller steps can begin. When Dr. Jennifer Madigan from San Jose State University, CA went to Cambodia with Mark and I in Jan of 2008, our vision was for a comprehensive and relative science curriculum in their own language, teacher training, and science equipment for Rongko School in Banteay Meanchey Province. This would then be multiplied into the other 24 provinces in which we plan to work. Science is our next open door in education to win the hearts and lives of the people to Jesus Christ who made all things. However, it's taking much longer than we had expected or hoped.

After we connected Dr. Madigan to the Director of Education in Cambodia, she had an open door with the Phnom Penh University and the surprising potential to develop a National Science Center with South East Asia Prayer Center. The plan is for us in September to bring a small group of education heads to the U.S. to see our National

Science Center, meet with potential investors and the San Jose State University.

We return in July for three weeks with a science fair kit, experiments and other help to train the teachers to do their own fair by October. The fair should kick off interest everywhere for the science curriculum. During this time is our first high school graduation in Banteay Meanchey of 73 students. The building and program for the first term of college will be being readied during this time as well. The science curriculum training and development will continue into the other provinces. And the development of the National Science Center will start.

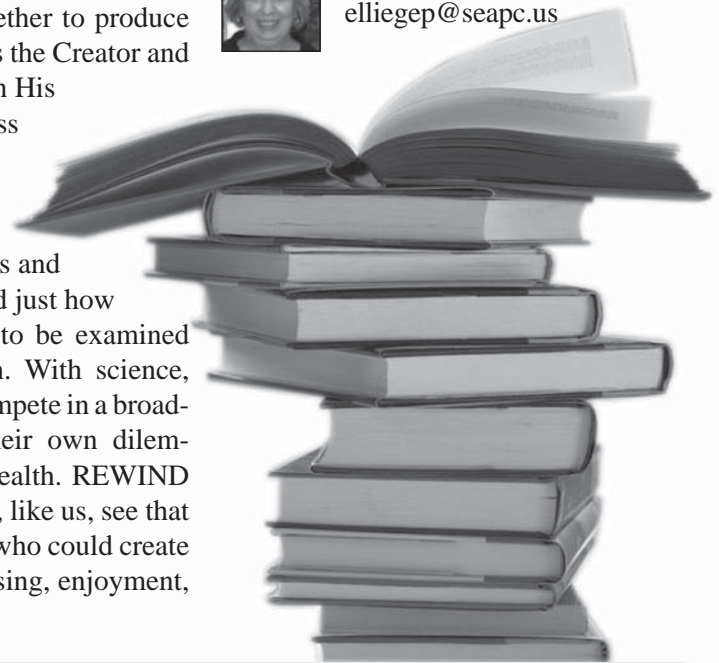
All this should work together to produce the knowledge that God is the Creator and He has the whole world in His hands — His awesomeness is only explained after learning just how big the universe is through measurement comparisons and making planet models and just how small things when have to be examined a microscope to be seen. With science, Cambodia's youth can compete in a broader marketplace, solve their own dilemmas, prosper and be in health. REWIND — Cambodia's youth can, like us, see that He (God) is the only one who could create it all to work for our blessing, enjoyment, and prosperity.

Of course this is going to be expensive — but God will supply all of our needs according to His riches in glory.

What we need now is prayer for all of these steps — the agreement details with Dr. Madigan, the curriculum, the training, the ongoing comprehensive plan in science, the graduation, the opening the university, building a National Science Center.
